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PPE Exams

An ideal time to get revision into a routine

All GCSE regulations will be in place to allow pupils to know what will happen in the actual exams.

Exam Regulations & Updates

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Summer Timetable is currently being finalised and roomed

It will be shared with parents and students via Arbor app after the PPE exams have been completed.

Please remember that your child must be available for contingency day - **24th June**

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Before the exams

Students will be reminded of the procedures and regulations for exams again before they start

During the real exam season some revision sessions may be offered in the mornings or after school to support students - We will keep you updated on this

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Students must be on time for all of the exams

However, if your child will be late for an exam, follow these steps:

- Step 1: Telephone the school and explain what has happened – you will be called back if reception can't find the exams officer straight away
- Step 2: **Follow the instructions given by the exams officer when called back**
- Step 3: If going to be late - When the child arrives at school go to reception and explain that you are late for an exam and that you need to see the exam officer immediately
- Step 4: **Your exams officer (or an invigilator) will give you the full instructions for the exam, and answer any questions, before you are allowed to begin your exam, time depending.**

There is a cut off time where they won't be allowed to sit the exam

If your child is feeling unwell on the day of an exam, follow the steps below

- Step 1: Telephone the school and explain that your child is unwell but that they have an exam today
Step 2: Follow the instructions given by the exams officer, who will call you back
- Step 3: Try and get some evidence to prove your illness (e.g. a doctor's note)

Any exam absence must be for a good reason – exam board stipulation

What materials should you bring to an exam

You must bring the following materials with you to every examination:



Must be transparent but can't be coloured and transparent

Please ensure that

Your child arrives in full school uniform – 245 children's identities have to be verified so school uniform helps with this and it is a school expectation

Your child is fully equipped and ready for their exam – please read their exam timetable with them so they are organised

Handy Tips

Ensure that students are getting enough sleep and taking breaks

Getting proper nutrition

Control of screen time - do they need their phone whilst revising?

Be positive – the next few months will be challenging but we can do it!

Keep school posted of any issues

Check messages so that you know what is happening in school – exams and events

Check ARBOR regularly

Ask your child to show you what revision they are doing

Check they are organised and are bringing the right equipment

Revision

Your child has been given a revision timetable and should be doing self directed revision at home.

Some general guidelines are;

1. Don't just copy out of textbooks – there should be a specific activity to make the brain work harder – this will also save time
2. Take breaks
3. Mix up subjects and topics
4. Practice remembering topics



Revision Techniques

Look, cover, write – for lists and keywords

Self quizzing – transforming pieces of information into questions

Mind mapping (brainstorm)– exploring ideas and connections

Dual Coding – designing icons to go with words, pieces of information

Flash cards (also called Leitner cards)

Make posters/ use post its of key info and put up round the house

Past papers – loads can be found on the internet but try to get the marks scheme so that the student can see what the correct answers were

Don't spend ages colouring in and making it look nice

Mix up topics and revisit topics

AI and Assessments A quick guide for students



What is AI?

- AI stands for artificial intelligence and using it is like having a computer that thinks
- AI tools like ChatGPT or Snapchat My AI can write text, make art and create music by learning from data from the Internet, but watch out – they can also make things up and be biased



How can AI be misused In assessments?

AI misuse is when you take something made using AI and say it's your own work.

How do I make sure I don't misuse AI?



1 Know the rules

- You're not allowed to use AI tools when you're in an exam
- Your teachers will tell you if you're allowed to use AI tools when doing your coursework – the rules will depend on your qualification
- Even if you're allowed to use AI tools, you can't get marks for content just produced by AI – your marks come from showing your own understanding and producing your own work

2 Reference reference reference!

- If you're allowed to use AI tools, you must reference them clearly
- Name the AI tool you used
- Add the date you generated the content
- Explain how you used it
- Save a screenshot of the questions you asked and the answers you got

3 Declare it's all your own work

– When you hand in your assessment, you have to sign a declaration. Anything without a reference must be all your own work. If you've used an AI tool, don't sign the declaration until you're sure you've added all the references.

REMEMBER



What happens if I misuse AI?

If you've misused AI, you could lose your marks for the assessment – you could even be disqualified from the subject.

DON'T RISK IT!

Get, review and share your education record on your phone when you move from school to sixth form or college.




Get your education record

Information like your GCSE results will be added to your record when available.




Share your education record
